

Apostolic Institutions at the Service of Mission, 2014/01

- "Each Province or Region concretizes the mission of the universal Society through an Apostolic Plan by means of a careful discernment process."
- An "apostolic plan ... identifies the goals, priorities and resources for service that a Province or Region contributes to the Missio Dei"
- "In this way the Province or Region shapes its identity, its dreams and hopes, its objectives and priorities in order to help Jesuits and their collaborators—as well as the apostolic institutions themselves—to continually renew themselves and progress decisively on the path toward greater service by putting into practice, with both realism and hope, the guidelines of the recent General Congregations."



"Institutions carry with them potential risks. They can become outmoded and irrelevant, lose their religious and Jesuit identity, consume a large number of personnel and financial resources, and thus become obstacles to apostolic mobility, overlooking other creative apostolic initiatives."

"It is not enough that the enterprise functions well, offers good service, enjoys prestige and is a place much sought out by people. It is an issue of knowing how or whether our institutions continue to be primarily apostolic instruments, clear about their primary aim of serving the mission of the Church and of the Society."

Apostolic planning is a journey of communal discernment and renewal


It is *how* we make the journey that matters. God's grace renews us *during* the journey.



Main steps of the process


- 1. Realize our current situation
- 2. Recall God's grace in our history
- 3. Rediscover our mission and identity
- 4. Reflect on signs of the times
- 5. Recognize God's Call for the present time
- 6. Respond in action
- 7. Review our progress
- Follows the movements of Spex
- A process of transformation

1. Realize our current situation



- How are we now?
- What are the consolations and desolations in the province? Where do we find life?
 What has not been so life-giving?
- What is God revealing to us about our current reality?
- What graces do we rejoice in? What conversions do we need?
- Method of situational discernment
- Prayer, Reflection, Spiritual Conversation
- Attentive loving presence to one another and to myself
- Listening and sharing from the heart, rather than focusing on statistics


An authentic communal examen will bring to the surface resonances <u>and</u> contrasts in perspectives, feelings, experiences



- Welcome and listen to each one
- Seek to understand and empathize
- Gain insight into the collective reality
- Grow as a discerning body

2. Recall God's grace in our history

- Before we plan for the future, we need to appreciate the past
 - What were the significant milestones? The challenges and graces? The ways we have changed?
 - How has God been present?
 - What does that reveal about our life and mission, our identity before God?
- Gratitude for the past helps us to:
 - Regain a sense of our roots
 - Realize that change is a reality
 - Renew our confidence in God's fidelity
 - Acknowledge each others' contributions
 - Let go and be more open to moving forward



Institutions go through life cycles as the context evolves. Recalling the past also helps us to locate ourselves along the journey



3. Rediscover our mission and identity

- The compass for planning
 - The Missio Dei, the Gospel vision
 - SJ mission and identity
 - Global orientations in current context: GC 36, UAPs
 - Local expression of SJ mission and identity
 - Enlightened by review of our graced history
 - The local realities





- We seek new life once again in the roots, seeing with new eyes, allowing God to move our hearts
- Counters: Individualism, populism, vain glories, dwelling in the past, being stuck in routines, and over-influence from funders and others
- Formative for both Jesuits and collaborators



4. Reflect on signs of the times

- Discernment is based on concrete realities
 - Internal situation, personnel, resources, fruitfulness, relationships, strengths and weaknesses
 - External contexts: current situation of world and church; emerging trends



- Listen in spirit of discernment
 - Invite voices inside the 'box'; and also get out of the box to hear alternative views
 - Go to the margins, near to ground realities. Hear people's stories.
 Look for both lights and shadows.
 - Listen with head and heart. Verify, reflect, ponder, pray. How is God moving in the context?
 - Pastoral listening leads to our conversion


"Re-educating" our senses



5. Recognize God's call for the present time



- What is the Spirit asking of us?
 - Main direction for our life and mission in the next x years
 - Pertains to both apostolic mission and our conversions



5. Recognize God's call for the present time



- Main direction for our life and mission in the next x years
 - Needs to be a communal spiritual discernment
 - Shows us the way even in difficult times, unexpected storms, failures
 - Not to be changed in time of desolation
- Key priorities:
 - What needs closer attention in the next 5 years?
 - Apostolic priorities (Indicates the issue or concern you wish to address; the target groups; the transformation you desire, the particular role you play, etc)
 - Internal priorities (Improvements to Cura personnalis, governance, resources, etc)


6. Respond in action

- Identify concrete goals:
 - What to change, strengthen, improve, start, discontinue?
 - Set targets where appropriate so as to guide allocation of personnel, time, and resources
 - Spirit of discernment
- Do action plan: What, Who, When
- Put in place the means for coordination and monitoring of implementation

What changes are needed?

New priorities often do not fit with existing structures.

Hence need a systemic approach: What adjustments are needed in the current structures, policies, personnel, resources, activities in view of the new priorities?



7. Review our progress

- Regular communal spiritual examen of our life and mission. How are we growing (or not) towards the Call? How has God been present?
- Confirm or fine-tune priorities
- Make changes in the action plan if needed
- Widen the communication and collaboration
- Sustain growth as a discerning body
 - "Discernment in common is the prior condition for apostolic planning ... Thus, discernment in common and apostolic planning work in tandem to ensure that decisions are made in the light of the experience of God, and that these decisions are put into practice in such a way that they realize the will of God with evangelical effectiveness. (On Discernment in Common, 2017/11)

How to incorporate the UAPs

- If you're going to begin apostolic planning:
 - Consider the UAPs when reflecting on mission (step 3) or when choosing apostolic priorities (step 5)
- If you're in the middle of apostolic planning:
 - Pray with UAP texts (Feb, Apr 2019 letters) before finalizing your apostolic plan. What is the Spirit saying?
 - Things to confirm
 - Things to deepen
 - Things to reconsider
- If you had already completed apostolic planning:
 - Have regular communal spiritual examen of progress. Pray with the apostolic plan and listen once again to the UAP texts. Do you feel moved to make certain adjustments to your apostolic plan? (eg. Specific goals, actions, target groups, etc)

THE "THREE TIMES" FOR APOSTOLIC PLANNING:

- 1. As a regular process of renewal
 - At least once every 5-10 years, depending on type of community, stage of growth, and context
- 2. When there is currently no plan, and the province seems to lack focus, clarity, direction, unity, energy.
- 3. When the previous plan or the current 'flightpath-by-default' no longer seems relevant in a changing context
 - Importance of on-going examen and attentiveness to reality
 - Don't make the decision alone. Consult others.



The "three times" for NOT doing apostolic planning yet

- When there is an acute crisis
 - Eg. Country in political crisis, war, natural disaster, pandemic. Unpredictable daily changes in situation and/or need to focus on emergency response
 - Eg. Crisis in province or institution; eg. Scandal, unexpected major change, significant conflict, very low morale, insecurity, etc.
 - Focus on crisis response and wait for time of more stability
- When the leader or leadership team needs to establish credibility
 - E.g. Past plans not implemented; members are disillusioned with planning; feeling "planning fatigue"; New leader just appointed
 - Focus on listening and getting the house in order. Build trust and credibility first

The "three times" for NOT doing apostolic planning yet

- When most people are new and lack experience, skills, relationships or commitment to participate meaningfully
 - Eg. New or neglected communities, new organization/province, or recent turnover of many personnel
 - Facilitate basic formation, information sharing, and relationship-building first

Conditions for discernment:

- Interior freedom
- Union of minds and hearts
- Basic knowledge and skills
- Desire to commit

Preparation

Role of the leader:

- Discern thru consultation When is suitable time to embark on apostolic planning?
- Form a coordinating team to manage the process
 - Ensure their availability to focus on this task
 - Propose steps and timeline
- Discern about participation (Jesuits and collaborators) and external partners (stakeholders, facilitators, etc)
- Ensure adequate resources
- Communicate about it, clarify expectations, address anxieties
 - Reasons for embarking on the process
 - Emphasis on communal spiritual discernment
 - Steps, timeline, activities
 - Participation, roles, responsibilities
- Ensure training and orientation where needed (eg. spiritual conversation, UAPs, etc)

Pastoral Planning Through Communal Discernment

This website offers reflections and resources for pastoral planning by communities and organizations in the Catholic faith tradition and beyond. Who am I? Where am I going? What is life all about?

These questions seem to be etched deeply in the human heart. They come to the surface whenever we face a personal crisis and the road ahead is not so clear. These same questions also come to mind when we desire to live and act intentionally and authentically. In each season of life, they resurface to beckon new answers.


For a community or organization, these questions are relevant too. Who are we as a group? How did we come to exist? What is our common life all about? Do we have a unique contribution to make? Where should we go? What should we do now? Just as for an individual, these questions are often triggered when there is a crisis, or when the group finds itself at the crossroads, and new stages of its journey require a re-examination of its priorities and way of proceeding.

Confronting these questions and following through on the answers is not easy because it often involves uncertainty, tension, letting go, and being open to change. However, this is the path that potentially leads to greater fullness of life. Conversely, avoiding the struggle or pain of dealing with these questions will only prolong the drift and dispersion of the group, and eventually lead to desolation and despair.

Intentional and authentic living as a community entails journeying through these questions on a regular basis, and carrying out their implications faithfully, evaluating along the way. It is a process that engages the whole community in heart, mind, and soul. As a result, the community grows fruitfully in its identity, values, life, and mission. A corresponding integration at the personal level among its members often happens as well.
